Lears, 2020-09-15 Between late antiquity and the fifteenth century theologians philosophers and poets struggled to articulate the correct relationship between sound and sense creating taxonomies of sounds based on their capacity to carry meaning In *World of Echo* Adin E Lears traces how medieval thinkers adopted the concept of noise as a mode of lay understanding grounded in the body and the senses With a broadly interdisciplinary approach Lears examines a range of literary genres to highlight the poetic and social effects of this vibrant discourse offering close readings of works by Geoffrey Chaucer and William Langland as well as the mystics Richard Rolle and Margery Kempe Each of these writers embraced an embodied experience of language resistant to clear articulation even as their work reflects inherited anxieties about the appeal of such sensations A preoccupation with the sound of language emerged in the form of poetic soundplay at the same time that mysticism and other forms of lay piety began to flower in England As Lears shows the presence of such emphatic aural texture amplified the cognitive importance of feeling in conjunction with reason and was a means for the laity including lay women to cultivate embodied forms of knowledge on their own terms in precarious relation to existing clerical models of instruction *World of Echo* offers a deep history of the cultural and social hierarchies that coalesce around aesthetic experience and gives voice to alternate ways of knowing

Chaucer and Fame Isabel Davis, Catherine Nall, 2015
Fama or fame is a central concern of late medieval literature. Where fame came from, who deserved it, whether it was desirable, how it was acquired, and kept were significant inquiries for a culture that relied extensively on personal credit and reputation. An interest in fame was not new, being inherited from the classical world but was renewed and rethought within the vernacular revolutions of the later Middle Ages. The work of Geoffrey Chaucer shows a preoccupation with ideas on the subject of fama, not only those received from the classical world but also those of his near contemporaries. Via an engagement with their texts, he aimed to negotiate a place for his own work in the literary canon, establishing fame as the subject site at which literary theory was contested and writerly reputation won. Chaucer's place in these negotiations was readily recognized in his aftermath as later writers adopted and reworked postures which Chaucer had struck in their own bids for literary place. This volume considers the debates on fama which were past, present, and future to Chaucer, using his work as a centre point to investigate canon formation in European literature from the late Middle Ages and into the Early Modern period. This Approaches to Teaching volume aims to provide students with a vision of Chaucer that highlights the great variety, breadth, and depth of his entire body of work. Although Chaucerians recognize that *Troilus and Criseyde* and the shorter poems are as entertaining and complex as the more familiar *Canterbury Tales*, teachers of medieval English do not readily include these texts in their courses. The materials collected here offer instructors ideas and strategies for making Chaucer's lesser-taught works as memorable and engrossing.

for students as any of the narrative gems in *Canterbury Tales Part 1 Materials* discusses available teaching resources focusing not only on the many editions of Chaucer's works in Middle English but also on translations for teachers whose students turn to modern English as a study aid. The essays in part 2 *Approaches* begin by exploring the poetry's backgrounds including sources and genre, the growth of the English vernacular as a literary language, Chaucer's conception of history in its Christian, classical, and English political senses, the role of manuscript study in illuminating the historical record, and Chaucer's representation of gender. The section on teaching the poems features essays that offer suggestions for overcoming students' difficulties with Middle English, consider the relation between Chaucer and his readers, assess various theoretical models, and show how a wide range of visual imagery can be used in the classroom. A final section on course contexts includes essays on teaching these poems for the first time as well as designing classes for nonmajors and graduate students.
