## DEFINITION

Group dynamics refers to the patterns of behavior and interpersonal relationships within a group. It encompasses how group members interact, communicate, make decisions, and assume specific roles, ultimately shaping the group's overall performance and effectiveness.

## EXAMPLES

- **Positive interdependence:** A good group has a sense of positive interdependence. This is a term used to describe a group dynamic wherein individual and group goals are aligned.
- **Shared purpose:** One of the first things a group lays out when it comes together is its purpose.
