

Wellington, 1989 The use of microcomputers in elementary education is described by focusing on an empirical study of computer use in a 10% random sample of elementary schools in one large local education authority The inclusion of people at the grass roots level was considered to be a priority Interviews of school level administrators teachers and students were supplemented by first hand observations of computer utilization Results indicate that schools vary tremendously both in terms of the use to which they put computers and the effectiveness of computer applications in the classroom In spite of the publicity and the rhetoric of politicians generally speaking the introduction of the microcomputer has led to very few changes of any significance Results of the study are presented in three sections 1 facilities and fabric factors relating to hardware software and school buildings 2 human involvement headteachers and teachers attitudes and opinions inservice provision and students attitudes and 3 organization and management factors relating to school organization and classroom management of the microcomputer Ethnographic data are presented throughout all three sections A list of 10
