

Talking to a child about death

Use simple language

Avoid using complex medical terms or euphemisms that may confuse the child.

Reassure

Reassure the child they are safe. Children may worry that they or a loved one will die too. Validate their worry and let them know how you are taking care of them and yourself.

Create a Memorial

Helping a child make a memorial provides a space for grieving and remembering their person.

Be Honest

Children can sense when something is wrong. Explain that the person has died and won't be coming back.



Embrace Emotions

Children may react in different ways to the death including sadness, anger, or confusion. Allow them to express their emotions and offer support.

Allow Questions

Children may have a lot of questions about death. Some may feel awkward and difficult to answer. It's okay to tell a child you don't know.

Seek Support

If you or your child is struggling with the loss seek support from a therapist or a support group.
