Groenwald,Margaret Frogge,Michele Goodman,Connie Henke Yarbro,1996-04 *18 - EFFECTIVENESS OF THE CANCER SYMPTOM MANAGEMENT SYSTEM: SYMPTOM MANAGEMENT IMPROVES YOUR LIFE (SMILE): A RANDOMIZED CONTROLLED TRIAL.* ,2017 Introduction Electronic systems can facilitate symptom monitoring and management The purpose of this study was to evaluate the effect of the Cancer Symptom Management System Symptom Management Improves your Life SMILE which combined electronic symptom management and evidence based patient education for cancer symptom management Methods A nonblinded randomized controlled trial was conducted Cancer patients starting adjuvant or palliative chemotherapy CTx were randomized to control symptom monitoring experimental 1 Exp 1 symptom monitoring report or experimental 2 Exp 2 symptom monitoring report ONS PEP guided evidence based symptom management education groups in a 1 2 2 ratio N 249 Additional benefit of symptom management education to continuous symptom monitoring was analyzed by comparing the Exp 1 and Exp 2 groups utilizing Mann Whitney U test and generalized estimating equations n 199 Results Fatigue and sleep disturbance changes were different between Exp 1 and Exp 2 groups among patients receiving adjuvant CTx p 042 and p 008 Fatigue gradually decreased after a peak at the 1st CTx cycle in Exp 2 whereas Exp 1 experienced increasing fatigue until the 3rd CTx cycle A gradual decrease in sleep disturbance was observed in Exp 2 after the 2nd CTx cycle whereas Exp 1 experienced a steady increase in the symptom Participants were willing to monitor symptoms using the Cancer Symptom Management System Evidence based symptom management education was considered as easy to understand and helpful

Conclusions The Cancer Symptom Management System SMILE incorporating evidence based symptom management education effectively managed fatigue and sleep disturbance after adjuvant CTx Integrating electronic symptom management system and evidence based symptom management education is recommended to better manage fatigue and sleep disturbance among patients receiving adjuvant CTx **Symptom management in advanced cancer** R.
