The effects of these changing contexts upon such masters as Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina and Claudio Monteverdi are fully documented here, but this is less a great composer book than a study of secular, sacred, and theatrical styles and genres both within the musical marketplace and in

relation to music's sister arts. The author also attempts to view music and indeed all the arts as essentially political phenomena conditioned by but also conditioning social and cultural constraints. There are copious music examples and an extensive bibliography. Considerable space is also devoted to extracts from contemporary documents in translation to allow the reader first-hand experience of one of the most exciting periods in music history.
